Manor of Sames, Parish of Cottenham, Cambridgeshire.

Legal Note: The present lord of the manor owns only the title. He does not have any piece of land. He does not have or pretend to have any kind of rights over any land in the manor area.

The identified lords of the manor of Sames

Prior the subinfeudation

Prior the creation of the manor of Sames (by subinfeudation) the territory was ruled by lords we will name pre-Lords

They were:

Ufi	of	Willingha

or Lefwine son of Aethulf

or Athelstan Manneson till 986, then his son Godric or Aethelwine, ealdorman of East Anglia

Or a combination of above pre-Lord 1

Then it came, after 996, and prior 1066, to the abbey of Ely and his abbot till 1109 pre-Lord 2

1109: abbey of Ely becomes a cathedral, abbot becomes **Bishop of Ely** pre-Lord 3

A freehold, under the bishop of Ely

Sames is probably the freehold, under the overlord of bishop of Ely, owned by Walsh family:

Cecily Walsh (?-1328-?) have some lands in 1328 and Simon Walsh in 1329. Then there are no more info about this family.

The manor takes the name of Sames

In 1328 **Hugh de Saham** (Soham) witnesses a granting of land on Cottenham. **Lord 9**

He has probably yet some land there. He may be the 9th lord

In 1333 Simon de Saham holds land in Cottenham Lord 10

The estate takes the name of its owner, SAHAM, this will become later SAMES

SAMES is now mentionned as a manor, bishop of Ely being the overlord

John Windsor of Rampton holds the manor in 1389 and 1392.

He holds by knight service from bishop of Ely

Then it's obscure till **Thomas Burgoyne** who holds it in 1458 till his death in 1470 Lord 12

Lord 11

It then descends like IMPINGTON manor:

SAMES manor is divided betwen two daughters:

→ 1 half to Elizabeth Burgoyne, her husband is Thomas Thursby: they hold 1505 to 1543

Then their son Edmund Thusby holds 1543 to 1547.

His widow Ursula holds 1547 to 1567 (she married with Erasmus Spelman)

Her son Thomas Thursby from 1567 to 1579

He sells SAMES manor to John Pepys of Cottenham in 1579. John dies 1589

His son Thomas is supposed to inherit but executors take some delay and the half of the manor disappear from archive after 1596, possibly this half was merged and managed by the Pepys family with the manor of Pelhams (till 1780) also in Cottenham

→ 1 half to Margareth Burgoyne, her husband is George Heveningham They hold 1505 to 1530		
Their daughter, Mary Heveningham, inherits 1530 she dies 1532/3 Her daughter Anne inherits 1532/3, her husband is Sir Ambrose Jermyn. They sell in 1549		
The manor is sold in 1549 to John Playforth	Lord 17	

The manor is sold some time before 1596 to Sir Francis Hinde.

The lords of the manor of SAMES, CROWLANDS and LISLE:

When Francis Hinde of Madingley (knight since 1578) dies in 1596, he is lord of SAMES, CROWLANDS and LISLE (all in Cottenham). They will stay under the same owner, but keep separate records, they are not legally merged.

Alice Winde inherits so in 1721. She is wife of John Dacres, and George Rogers	Lady 25	
She left her possession in 1728 in Cottenhanm (including SAMES manor) to the antiquary		
Roger Gale a great-nephew of her grandmother's husband John Pepys.	Lord 26	
Roger sells in 1737 to Edward Snagge who dies 1739	Lord 27	
His cousin George Snagge inherits (he dies 1753)	Lord 28	
His widow Ann dies in 1770	Lady 29	

1/3 goes to George's sister Mary Mart

2/3 goes to Ann's nephews and niece Richard, Thomas, and Ann Bacchus

William Finch Ingle aka William Finch Finch bought Mary part, and kept the manorial right later

Manorial court were held jointly till 1784

so Mary Mart then William Finch Finch, and Richard+Thomas+Ann Bacchus

are co-Lords and Ladies from 1770 to 1784.	co-Lords and Ladies 30	
William Finch Finch kept the manorial right (1784) and he dies 1826	Lord 31	
His son inherits, the Revd. Henry Finch	Lord 32	
Henry sells the possessions to Thomas Musgrave in 1828 Thomas Musgrave will be later archbishop of York and dies in 1860	Lord 33	
Musgrave's widow is Elizabeth (death 1863).	Lady 34	
His nephew C. B. Musgrave inherits (he dies 1881)	Lord 35	
And then his other nephew the Revd. V. Musgrave (dies 1906)	Lord 36	
Then comes Thomas Musgrave Francis of Quy Hall (dies 1931)	Lord 37	
His heir is John Clement Wolstan Francis (till 1978)	Lord 38
